ROAD SAFETY

Devon Street is a busy State Highway. It is especially dangerous in wet weather and during both morning and afternoons when the commuter traffic is heaviest. These times coincide with when students are making their way to or from school. There are some students not currently using the Devon Intermediate School pedestrian crossing who have been observed crossing Devon Street in a dangerous and reckless manner, in the vicinity of the Treehouse and near the Seaview Road intersection. This is an extremely hazardous practise. Motorists often have very limited visibility and do not expect to encounter pedestrians either on the traffic lanes or emerging suddenly from between parked cars. Motorists cannot be expected to cope with students darting onto the road or walking down the middle of the road on the white line. We are extremely concerned for your child's safety. We would appreciate it if all parents/caregivers could speak to their child about road safety and reinforce the importance of using pedestrian crossings.

WHAT RESEARCH SAYS ABOUT PARENT INVOLVEMENT IN CHILDREN'S EDUCATION IN RELATION TO ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT

Where children spend their time

• School age children spend 70 percent of their waking hours (including weekends and holidays) outside of school.

When parents should get involved

- The earlier in a child's educational process parent involvement begins, the more powerful the effects.
- The most effective forms of parent involvement are those which engage parents in working directly with their children on learning activities at home.

Impact

- 86 percent of the general public believes that support from parents is the most important way to improve the schools.
- Lack of parental involvement is the biggest problem facing public schools.
- Decades of research show that when parents are involved students have:
 - ➤ Higher grades, test scores, and graduation rates
 - Better school attendance
 - > Increased motivation, better self-esteem
 - Lower rates of suspension
 - Decreased use of drugs and alcohol
 - > Fewer instances of violent behaviour
- Family participation in education was twice as predictive of students' academic success as family socioeconomic status. Some of the more intensive programmes had effects that were 10 times greater rather than other factors.
- The more intensely parents are involved, the more beneficial the achievement effects.
- The more parents participate in schooling, in a sustained way, at every level in advocacy, decision-making and oversight roles, as fund-raisers and boosters, as volunteers and para-professionals, and as home teachers the better for student achievement.

Parent expectations and student achievement

- The most consistent predictors of children's academic achievement and social adjustment are parent expectations of the child's academic attainment and satisfaction with their child's education at school.
- Parents of high-achieving students set higher standards for their children's educational activities than parents of low achieving students.

Major factors of parent involvement

- Three major factors of parent involvement in the education of their children:
 - 1. Parents' beliefs about what is important, necessary, and permissible for them to do with and on behalf of their children;
 - 2. The extent to which parents believe that they can have a positive influence on their children's education; and
 - 3. Parents' perceptions that their children and school want them to be involved.
